Fashion Design - art of applying design, aesthetics and natural beauty to clothing and its accessories

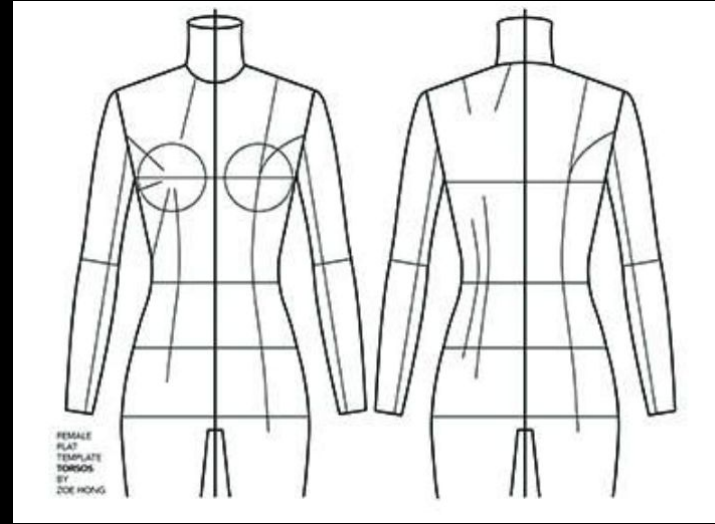
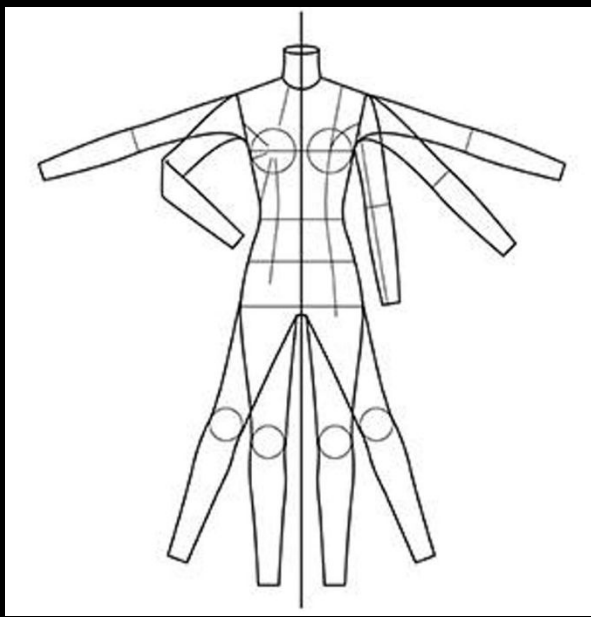
Important Distinction to Make:



Pattern - A graphic, repeated, decorative design, also called a print.



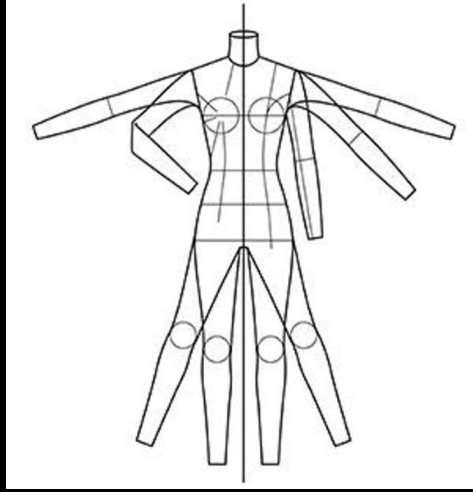
Pattern - template from which the parts of a garment are traced onto fabric before being cut out and assembled



Flat - A black and white fashion technical drawing that shows a garment as if it were laid to display all seams, topstitching, hardware, and any other design details

Three Distinct types of fashion:

1. Haute Couture - high-end, fashionable, one-of-a-kind clothing produced by leading fashion designers, made with a very specific, individual customer in mind.



2. Ready-to-Wear - made for the general market and sold through stores rather than made to order for an individual customer



3. Mass Market- made for the general market and sold through stores rather than made to order for an individual customer

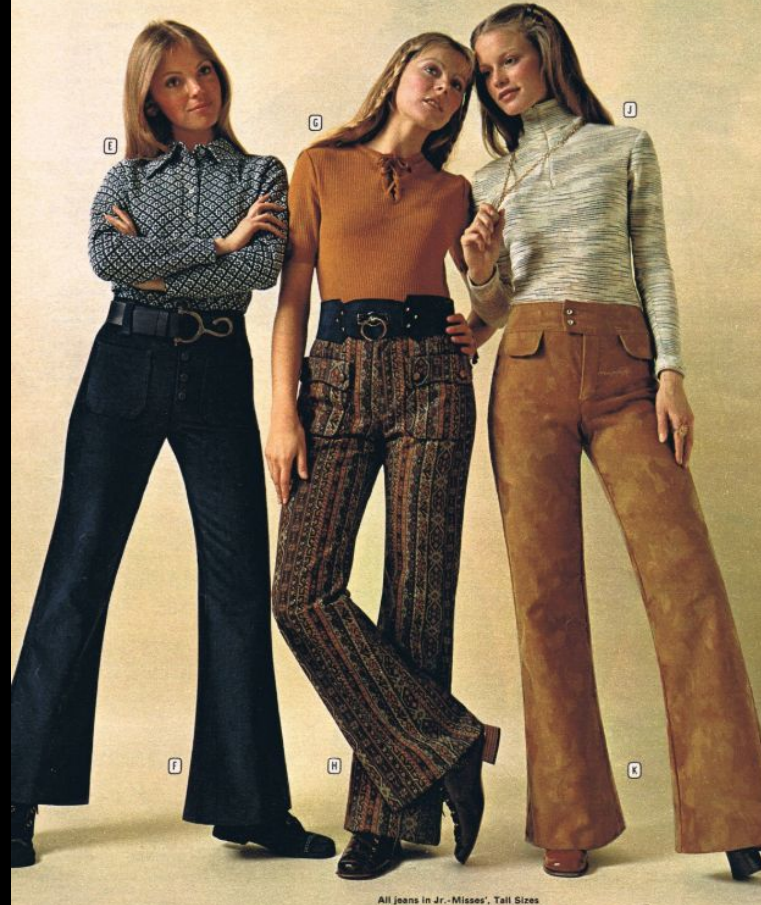

Silhouette - The overall outline or shape of a garment.

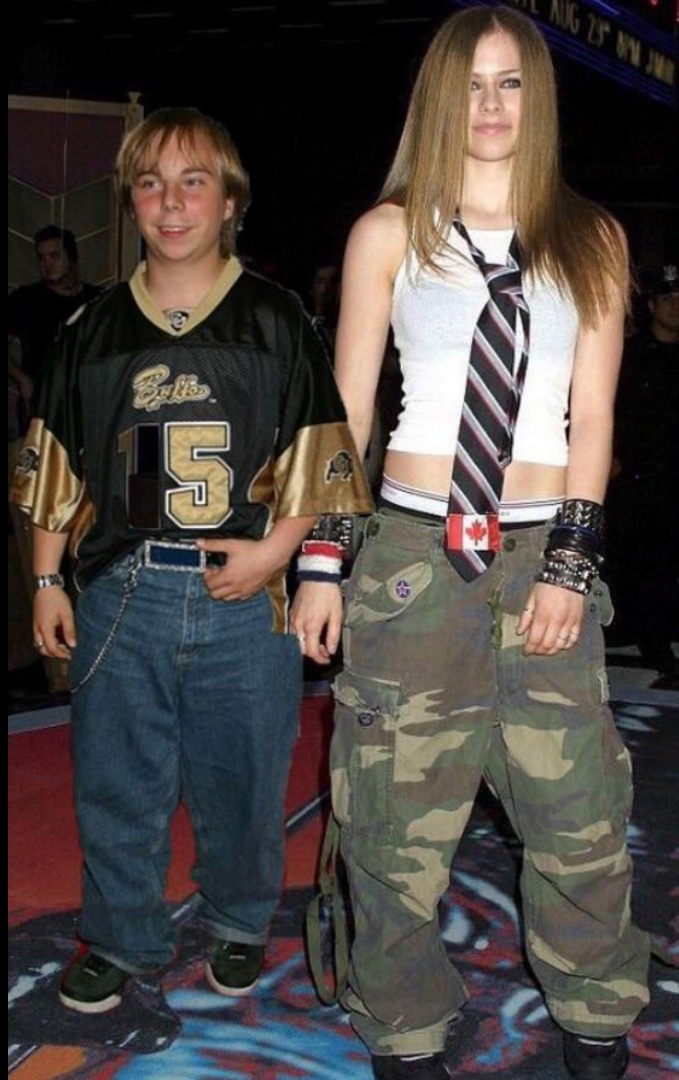
